PEORIANA

December 28, 1900-The Editor of the Star sat with one hand on the fluttering pulse of the Nineteenth Century and the other on his typewriter. As the dying moments passed, the holiday spirits set before his eyes a crystal globe. Squinting into the sphere that knows all past and future, the Editor saw a picture of Peoria fifty years later. He thumped his vision out on the keys and this is what he had:

"The Peoria of 1950 reaches from Chillicothe to Pekin, from East Peoria to Elmwood. Buildings 45 stories high pierce the skyline. Distance is annihilated with pneumatic tubes and air machine fleets taking the place of surface lines. Pekin has been in town quite a while. Elmwood is the 61st ward and Chillicothe the 67th.

"The Illinois river is arched over and serves as an enclosed sewer. Oldsters remember when people used to fish in its wat-

"The churches have consolidated into one great oratorium in the center of the city and sermons are disseminated by sound waves to people who stay at home and hear them from their family telephone phonographe.

"There is not an empire left on the face of the earth, not a crowned head. All countries are commonwealths and all cities socialistic. There is no money and no need for any. are no banks, no trusts and no caste. Everybody is equal. "Nobody works more than

31/2 hours a day in Peoria although in Chicago where the advantages are not so well em-ployed the working day is 12 minutes longer.

"The city is free of crime and there is no lunacy. The cit-izens wonder at the huge expense borne by the people half a century ago to support a large police force. Just the other day a creat other day a crazy man who thought he was a police chief was brought into court. doctors took him into a washroom, eracked his skull and removed the cog that twisted his mind. He was patched up and sent home with nothing more than a severe headache.

"President Snollowatski of the Republic of Russia is in town dickering on a proposition to extend the Peoria to St. Petersburg route to Siberia and Patagonia. He spoke highly of the feat of the line's flyers in extinguishing Mt. . Vesivius the other day. He told how the clipper airship Comet dropped a huge cone into the volsano's maw and another air freighter came along and dumped its ballast of fire clay into the cone. This heardened and sealed the mountain. . . .

"The city chemists have turned out some new mullipstawney soup tablets that are as good as their old corned beef issue, A man can carry enough in his vest pocket to feed the family for a week."

At this time the holiday spirits weakened, the crystal ball grew dim and the Editor ripped out hai copy and sent it to the printers.
