MURAL AT <u>Carver</u> Unveiled Sunday

Center's Founder Is Among Subjects

The four-months work of Clarence Shivers, in the form of a mural painting, "Pursuit of Freedom," was unveiled before 120 persons Sunday at Carver Com-

munity Center.

Prominent figures portrayed in the mural includes Ralph Bunche, a recently-appointed judge; George Washington Carver, the scientist; Ernest T. Atwell, Carver Center founder; Jackle Robinson, basebali player; and Col. Benjamin Davis, Shiver's commanding officer during World War II.

In a pre-unveiling talk, Dr. Harry Wood, dean of fine arts at Bradley university and Shiver's advisor during the painting, said of the mural: "It will broaden understanding through art, in the tradition of the great mural painters of the Renaissance and Mexico."
