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The council action came only a
day after the singer was named by
the house committee on un-American activities as one of a group of
persons "which are invariably found
supporting the Communist party
and its front organizations."
Allen Cannon, a member of the
music faculty of Bradley university
and the person under whose sponsorship Robeson was engaged to
sing at Peoria's Shrine mosque tomorrow, told a reporter:

"At the time I engaged Paul Robeson I belleved his presence would help enrich the community's musical life. But in the last few days events have made it clear a concert by Mr. Robeson at this time would be unwelcome here."

Report Light Ticket Sale In Champaign, Ill., Robeson said his manager had broken the Peoria concert contract at Cannon's re-quest after the latter reported few

tickets were being sold.

Meanwhile a mixed race committee of 11 arranged a reception for Robeson at the city hall tomorrow night, altho Mayor Carl O. Triebel polled the council before granting permission for use of the city hall.

"The aldermen who were favorable felt the hall should be available, but that if any subversive remarks were made, the meeting should be brought to a close," Triebel said.

He added that Robeson would be permitted to sing in the city hall room, but said that "unfortunately the room holds only about 150 people." Police, he said, would be presented.
