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Unveil Mural At Carver Center Today

The mural "Pursuit of Freedom" which a gifted young
Negro artist has painted on
one of the walls in the auditorium of Carver Community

center will be unveiled this afternoon.

After months of research, planning, rejecting, and starting over again, twenty-six year old Clarence Shivers has completed a job that is worthy of a more mature artist, according to those critics who have had a preview of his work.

Young Shivers, who has been drawing ever since he can remember, and painting since he was a young lad, has feelingly portrayed the attempt of the Negro to achieve equality. Not in a disorderly or confused composition, but in a forthright design that is touched with the magic of serently. His style is simple and direct showing imagination and sensitivity to his theme.

AGAINST A BACKGROUND of buildings and a suggested Statue of Liberty are such prominent figures in Negro achievement as Judge Ralph Bunch, one of todays leaders; George Washington Carver; Ernest T. Atwell, who founded Carver Center, Jackle Robinson, of the Brooklyn Dodgers, and Col. Benjamin Davis, who was Shivers' commanding officer of the 99th Fighter Squadron flying unit in World War II.

Shivers was an instructor, and during his three years stationed at Walterboro, N. C. he did several murals for the air base.

WITH THE EXCEPTION of Atwell and Dr. Carver I have only

The painting was done as a mural project under Dr. Harry Wood, dean of fine arts, Bradley University, where Shivers is completing his final semester under the G. I. Bill.

IN SPEAKING OF the work, Dr. Wood says, "Shivers has a real future as a muralist. He has very successfully combined the theme of accomplishment and aspiration

with satisfying artistic structure.
"The mural is not only ably
painted but it shows the exceptional ability of the young painter.]
It is sincerely and movingly con-

Shivers came to Bradiey from Lincoln University at Jefferson City, Mo. Three of his paintings won prizes at an exhibition in Atlanta. Ga. and one of them was
